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MESSAGE FROM OUR MAYOR



I hope you and your families are adjusting to the change in season as we head into winter. I am pleased to announce that Council has officially endorsed a new Community Vision for 2040 as well as the 12 recommendations made by the Community Panel.

The Community Panel worked together in April to better understand the business of Council – and so to have their recommendations incorporated into our strategic planning and vision for the future is something of which they should be very proud.

This new Community Vision is: *"Manningham is a peaceful, inclusive and safe community. We celebrate life with its diverse culture, wildlife and natural environment. We are resilient and value sustainable and healthy living, a sense of belonging, and respect for one another."*

This vision will be incorporated into our strategic documents which we are now developing.

Our Annual Budget for 2021/22 is being finalised and we had great input from our community which will help shape our financial future. Our final 2021/22 Annual Budget and Revenue and Rating Plan will be presented to Council for adoption before the end of this month. We're also working on developing our four-year Council Plan, Healthy City Strategy and Long-term Financial Plan to be introduced in July and August.

Finally, we have announced our involvement in a ground-breaking project to reduce our current energy bills and reduce electricity prices by using clean renewable energy generated right here in Victoria.

We are one of forty-six Victorian Councils to sign on to the Victorian Energy Collaboration (VECO), the largest ever emissions reduction project by local government in Australia. Through this collaboration, we will power almost 40 per cent of our electricity use with 100 per cent renewables, including power at our Civic Centre, Depot, MC Square and at the Pines Learning and Activity Centre.

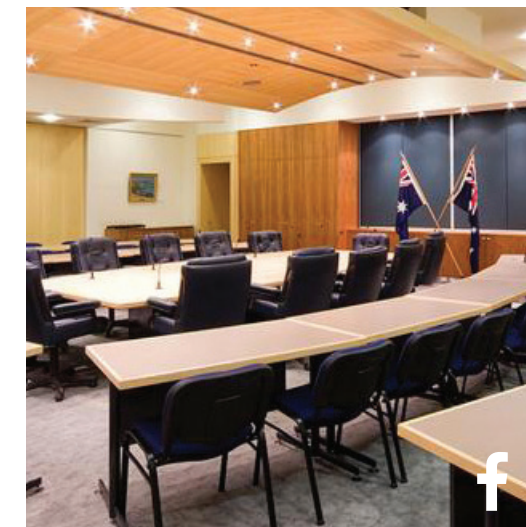

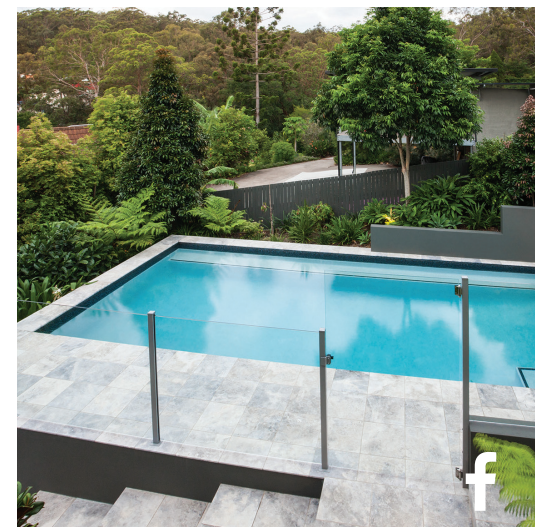

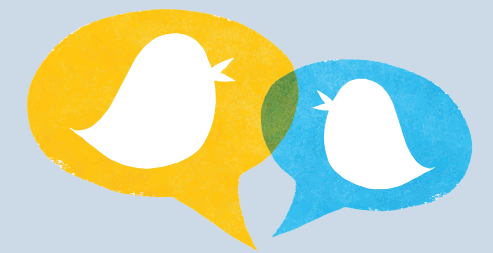

Disabled Parking Permits made easier

Do you need to apply for a new Accessible Parking Permit, or renew or replace an existing permit?

The Victorian Government has introduced a simpler process now known as the Accessible Parking Permit Scheme.

A new online system is available to help streamline the application process, improvements include:

- permanent permits are now valid for five years rather than three years
- a new permanent disability classification has been introduced, so that reassessments are not required for future permit renewals
- a new single and secure state-wide permit design that will reduce the misuse of permits
- the inclusion of occupational therapists as assessors, in addition to GPs.

All existing Disabled Parking Permits will remain valid until their expiry date or until 30 June 2023, whichever occurs first.

Disability Advisory Committee to provide vital perspectives

We have formed a new Disability Advisory Committee to provide advice and strengthen disability inclusion in and around our diverse city.

Ten of the participants have a lived experience of disability, including ADHD, autism, mental health issues, intellectual disability, physical disability, deafness or low vision. One is a support person and three are carer-parents of people with disability.

Members represent students, workers, full-time parents, unemployed people and volunteers. We spoke to committee member, Asherly Bradac, about her passion for disability inclusion and support.

Why did you want to join the Manningham Disability Advisory committee?

I am an advocate for both protecting and improving the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), with a desire to drive change. This is motivated by my own frustrating dealings with the NDIS in seeking support for myself and my children. This experience places me at the coalface of the hurdles faced by those in need of specialist support for themselves and their children, while also providing me with a unique understanding and knowledge of the failures of the system.

What areas of disability inclusion are you most passionate about?

I would like to use the knowledge, understanding and compassion from my lived experience to help the broader community. I believe in the importance of play, physical activity and literacy in the development of all children, with and without a disability, and how it helps with forming social connections and reducing social isolation. This is particularly important through team and social sport.

What would you like to share about disability inclusion with the community?

I passionately believe in protecting and providing safe and healthy communities and opportunities for all people in Manningham. The support systems for people with disability should be designed, delivered and evaluated by people who have lived experience of disability themselves.

SHOWING OUR PRIDE

Manningham had a colourful presence at this year's Midsumma Pride March, showing our support and commitment as a diverse and inclusive LGBTIQ+ friendly organisation.

Major upgrades to five playspaces

Families with young children now have better places to picnic and play, as we have upgraded five playspaces around Manningham – in Park Orchards, Bulleen, Wonga Park and two in Doncaster East.

As part of our Parks Improvement Plan, the playspaces have had more than \$700,000 in upgrades over the past few months are now open to enjoy.

DOMENEY RESERVE, PARK ORCHARDS

This upgrade includes new climbing, swinging and sliding play areas, nature play elements plus improved access paths and picnic area. This is a lovely spot high on the hill with great views of the Dandenong Ranges. The reserve has plenty of parking, toilets and a full size basketball court as well as the oval for ball games.

DUDLEY RESERVE, WONGA PARK

An upgrade to replace the climbing unit, swings and to complete landscaping around the playspace, creating a great spot to hang out before or after school.

WOODLEA RESERVE, DONCASTER EAST

This includes new play equipment for all ages, a bigger basketball and netball court, new picnic area and paths. This large park also has a hitting wall to practice your bat and ball skills and room to walk the dog.

KOONUNG PARK, BULLEEN

A significant upgrade to replace play equipment with activities for all ages, a new picnic shelter and barbecue for family picnics, access paths and landscaping making this a great place to visit. The fitness equipment beside the playspace gives parents the opportunity to be active or kick a ball on the oval when matches aren't on.

AINTREE RESERVE, DONCASTER EAST

An upgrade to play equipment with triple swings, slides, tunnels, a rope bridge and monkey bars, as well as a cubby. There are new paths added and rocks and logs for climbing, balancing and sitting on. This is a small but cosy park close to the school so pay a visit before or after school.

Highways and byways of Manningham

If anyone is qualified to write a history of our roads, long time Manningham resident Dr Maxwell Lay would have to be near the top of the list. His career includes leadership roles at the Australian Road Research Board and VicRoads, he was an independent reviewer for the Melbourne City Link Project and Chairman of the Royal Automobile Club of Victoria. Here, Dr Lay shares a fascinating journey through the history of our highways and byways.

The first settlers in the Manningham area grazed cattle on the south bank of the Yarra from Bulleen to Hawthorn and by 1838 had established sheep farms in the area's fertile riverside flats in Bulleen and Templestowe. Just downstream, the Bolin Bolin Billabong was a favoured campsite for the Indigenous community.

Both groups needed to travel downstream to the lower reaches of the Yarra - the obvious route was to stay on firm ground and cross the Koonung Creek near today's Bulleen Road crossing. From there, a shortcut avoiding the many twists of the river followed a relatively straight line south-west close to the path of today's Bulleen Road in North Balwyn, High Street in Kew and Church Street in Hawthorn.

For settlers, a common crossing of the Yarra was at Bridge Road in Richmond. Whilst we may assume that the settlers and their flocks followed pre-existing tracks created and used by the Indigenous peoples, cattle and sheep quickly destroyed any signs of such tracks. Wheeled vehicles also demanded something broader than metre-wide tracks, so Bulleen Road from Finns Reserve at Templestowe to Koonung Creek at North Balwyn would have been our first road.

On the other side of the river, early settlers with good resources had established major properties at Heidelberg and by 1840 a road had been established on the north bank of the Yarra linking Heidelberg and Melbourne. Early Bulleen residents would often have crossed the Yarra near Banksia Street, by 1839 a ferry was operating there and the first bridge was built in 1860.

Settlement of the area continued and by the 1850s there were extensive orchards in Doncaster, creating more need to travel to and from Melbourne. Using the Banksia Street crossing of the Yarra to join Heidelberg Road and head downstream remained popular and Manningham Road developed to service this Banksia Street traffic.

Manningham Road is a ridge road and used a ridge which linked it to Doncaster Road and then to Mitcham Road. Many pre-car roads were ridge roads and it was easy to see their appeal - they were never swampy and usually had a firm surface, the land itself was relatively cheap and you could see where you were. As you drive along them today, you can see how all the side streets on both sides of a ridge road such as Manningham Road slope downhill away from the road.

The main alternative to Banksia Street for travellers from Melbourne was to cross the Yarra at the east end of Bridge Road in Richmond, then use High Street, Kew to link up with Doncaster Road in North Balwyn, also a ridge road, before dropping down to a crossing of the Koonung Creek in Greythorn and then climbing the steep hill to today's Westfield Doncaster. The hill was a challenge in pre-car days and some travelers used the High Street ridge road in Templestowe for a more gradual climb to Manningham Road.

Travellers to Templestowe soon created Thompsons Road as a short cut to avoid Bulleen Road as it meandered along the riverside. Encouraged by the goldrush, a toll bridge over the Yarra linking Thompsons Road to Bonds Road in Eltham operated from 1855 to 1863.

Doncaster Road gained more importance with the discovery of gold in Warrandyte and in the mountains beyond Healesville in the 1850s. A common route to Healesville used Doncaster Road, Mitcham Road and the Maroondah Highway as it avoided swampy conditions in Balwyn.

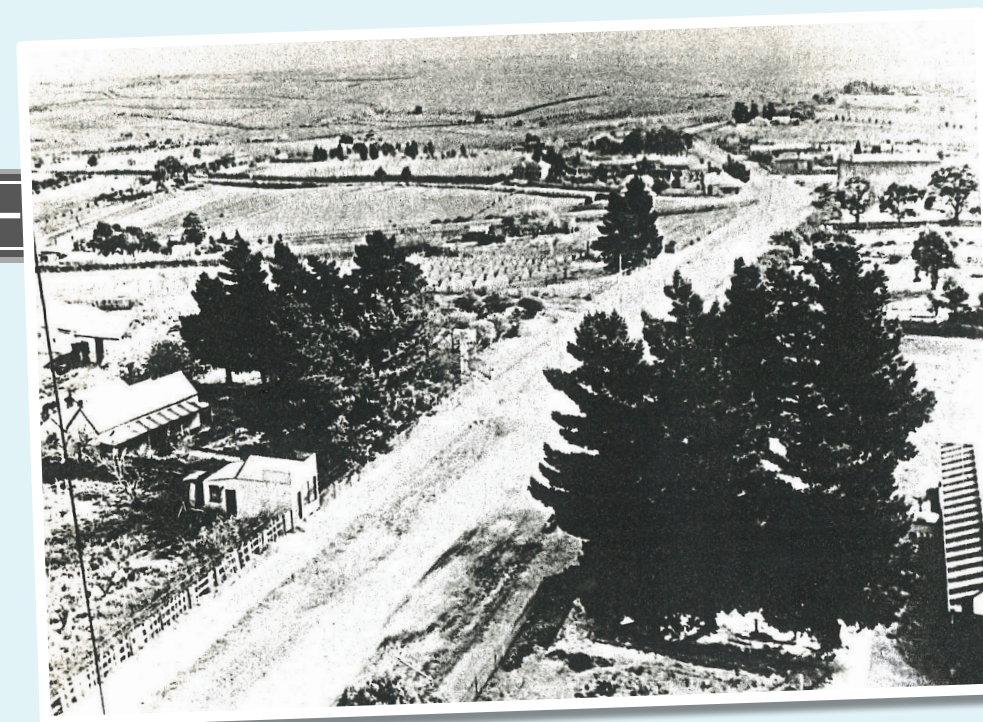
The gold rush meant Doncaster Road now split into a variety of tracks east of Blackburn Road. One appears to have headed northeast and used the southern end of today's Anderson Creek Road to cross Mullum Mullum Creek near Reynolds Road.

Another route to the goldfields left Doncaster Road on a route approximating today's Old Warrandyte Road and crossed Mullum Mullum Creek closer to the Tindalls Road crossing. It then proceeded near the line of Stintons and Falconer roads to Andersons Creek and Warrandyte. Indeed, an early name for Doncaster Road was Andersons Creek Road.

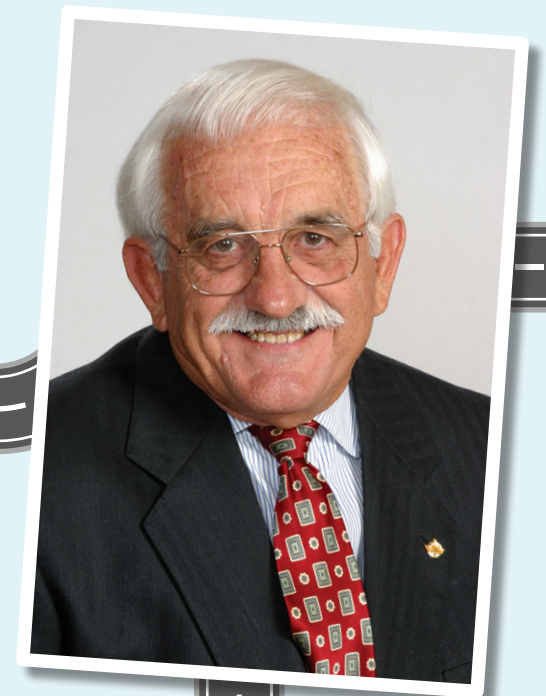
Templestowe Village was established in 1852. It was reached by Templestowe Road as an extension of Bulleen Road and then by High Street as a ridge road down from Doncaster Road. Access via Williamsons Road came later as it required very steep climbs out of the Mullum Mullum Creek valley, only practical as the motor car developed. Surveyed in 1855, the route was named after local landowner Robert Williamson, who donated land to the Church of Christ in 1864. At its northern end Fitzsimons Lane is shown as a road reservation 1854 maps and named after Fitzsimon, another early local land owner.

New church and community centre opens

The Manningham Uniting Church congregation is celebrating the completion and opening of its new church and community centre at 109 Wood Street, Templestowe, which they hope will be a welcoming presence in the community.

This is a major milestone for the church, formed in 2012 when four Uniting Church congregations in Manningham and Whitehorse combined into one community. In addition to the church itself, the new complex encompasses the Redgum Café, a Youth Hub, large foyer, playground, a mural wall, gardens, and a variety of multi-purpose spaces.

The complex has been designed with energy-efficiency and sustainability front of mind, as caring for the environment has been a long held commitment for the church community.

Design elements include double glazing of windows to provide extra insulation, energy efficient LED lights with motion sensors to lower energy consumption, radiant hot water heaters in the large indoor spaces and energy efficient air-conditioners in other spaces. Rainwater will be captured from the roof, plumbed to flush toilets throughout the building and used in landscape irrigation. Solar panels have been installed to transform sunlight into power to use for the building.

The church is holding an open day on Saturday 19 June from 10.00am. There will be food to share, coffee from the Redgum Café, demonstrations and displays showing how the variety of spaces can be utilised and people of all ages to guide you through the building.

New employment initiative for adults living with disability

Adults living with disability are gaining work-ready skills through work experience with Whitehorse Manningham Libraries.

The pilot program is made possible through the 2020 Pierre Gorman Award, an award given biennially by the Library Board of Victoria to support leadership in development of public library services for people with disability.

The *Our Library, Our Program: a job-ready initiative*, was initially postponed due to COVID-19 restrictions but has recommenced.

Participants in the program are designing, planning and hosting a library event to help them gain tangible skills and experience to assist with future employment opportunities.

The program is currently underway in conjunction with project partners Nadrasca and Onemda.

The new feature at the Lower Templestowe early learning and day care centre was designed and created by Kai Menzies, a Box Hill TAFE furniture design student.

Templestowe World of Learning's manager Shelley Jacobson says the centre had wanted to deliver a community project for some time and the opportunity provided by Manningham's Placemaking funding was the perfect way to make this a reality.

Shelley Jacobson says the children's reaction to the community corner was sheer delight.

"The children love it. As soon as they saw it they rushed to sit on the bench and explore all the books in the little library," she says.

Parents, grandparents and passersby are also enjoying the new literary space.

"Some of the parents have even taken ownership of the bench seat, saying it should be named after them," she laughs. "We'll set up a book exchange so everyone in the community can come and enjoy the little library."

"We also like the fact the chair and library were built by a local student who has used his skills to benefit the whole community," she says.

"What he has created for us is absolutely beautiful and the children just love it."

A new village vibe comes to Wonga Park

Wonga Park Community Cottage has transformed into a welcoming village space with a new community outdoor dining area to sit, connect and enjoy a cuppa.

Louise Schweiger of the Wonga Park Community Cottage identified the need for a local place where people could connect and share a coffee together.

"With the closure of the local village shopping centre at Wonga Park, places to grab a coffee and have a chat were few and far between," she says.

"We heard about the Placemaking funding and thought it would be great to create a COVID-safe space outdoors, where people could feel welcome to meet and connect with each other."

Designed to improve community partnerships, the outdoor seating area and planter boxes were installed to create a friendly, happy space.

"Manningham's design team consulted with us and came up with a wonderful plan. They were mindful of the rustic bush surroundings where the seating and tables would be installed and reflected this in the wooden materials they used," she says.

"The users of the Community Cottage really appreciate the initiative. What was a single use loading zone has now become a usable space. We're now in the process of contracting a coffee van to visit the site."

She explains the cottage will be a welcoming space for everyone in the community.

"Importantly this new outdoor community space can be used by people from the nearby tennis club, kindergarten, walking groups and wider community. It really fills the gap by connecting people and creating a little village space until the new shopping centre development comes online."

Warrandyte celebrates 170th anniversary of gold

Warrandyte is justifiably proud of its place in the gold history of Victoria.

In 1851, the area – formerly known as Anderson's Creek – was the first place in the early Victorian colony where gold was discovered and the first place to issue gold mining licences. This month, we celebrate the 170th anniversary of the discovery of gold in Warrandyte.

According to Warrandyte Historical Society, gold was discovered after a £200 reward was offered to anyone with information of a payable goldfield within 200 miles of Melbourne. This incentive was designed to stem the tide of hopefuls leaving Melbourne to join the gold rush at Bathurst in NSW.

Motivated by this reward, 26 year old publican Louis John Michel formed a party to explore for gold in the Yarra Valley. After two unsuccessful explorations with a larger party, Michel and fellow prospector William Habberlin set off again up the Yarra River in the early hours of a winter's morning in June 1851. This time they were successful.

While the Anderson's Creek goldfield did not match the richness of those around Bendigo and Ballarat, gold nevertheless provided the basis for the establishment of the township of Warrandyte. Activity grew and declined over the years but nevertheless the main gold-mining era continued until the mid-1920s and even sporadically afterwards.

Warrandyte is fortunate in that many relics of its gold mining days, such as the Pound Bend Tunnel, have survived. In 1935 a Gold Memorial Cairn was built on the banks of the Anderson Creek to commemorate the discovery. It can still be visited today, accessed from the Gold Memorial Road carpark. Many historic buildings within the township's heritage precinct are also still used, which help to retain the feel of an earlier time.

For those wanting to explore Warrandyte's golden past, the Warrandyte Museum with its gold display, leaflets and other information will be open on Saturdays and Sundays from 1.30pm to 4.30pm throughout June.

Παρά του ότι επηρεάζει έως και το 14% των ηλικιωμένων στην Αυστραλία, η κακοποίηση ηλικιωμένων είναι ακόμα σχετικά άγνωστη στην κοινότητα και περιστατικά τέτοιαν τραγικών συμβάντων συχνά δεν καταγγέλλονται.

على الرغم من التأثير على ما يصل إلى 14٪ من كبار السن في أستراليا، إلا أن إساءة معاملة المسنين لا تزال غير معروفة نسبيًا في المجتمع وغالبًا ما لا يتم الإبلاغ عن هذه الحوادث المتساوية.

يقول أندرو كونلون (Cr Andrew Conlon)، رئيس بلدية Manningham، إن إساءة معاملة المسنين هي أي فعل يتسبب في إلحاق الضرر بكبار السن وغالبًا ما يقوم به شخص يعرفه ويثق به.

ويقول أيضاً: "يمكن أن تكون الإساءة جسدية أو اجتماعية أو مالية أو نفسية أو جنسية، ويمكن أن تشمل سوء المعاملة والإهمال، وهي شكل من أشكال العنف الأسري".

وفي هذا العام، نعمل مع ستة مجالس بلدية أخرى - Boroondara و Knox و Maroondah و Monash و Whitehorse و Yarra Ranges - لزيادة الوعي حول الشيخوخة. ومعًا، ندير حملة مشتركة تسمى EveryAGE Counts in Melbourne's East لتحتدي الأفكار النمطية لكبار السن وتشجيع الناس على التحدث واتخاذ الإجراءات. ويتم تنسيق الحملة من قبل Inner East Primary Care Partnership.

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Campaign to counter elder abuse

Despite affecting up to 14 per cent of older people in Australia according to the Australian Institute of Family Studies, elder abuse is still relatively unknown in the wider community and incidents of this tragic occurrence are often unreported.

Manningham Mayor Cr Andrew Conlon says elder abuse is any act that causes harm to an older person and is often carried out by someone they know and trust.

“Abuse can be physical, social, financial, psychological or sexual, it can include mistreatment and neglect, and is a form of family violence” he says.

“There are older people in our community who suffer at the hands of abuse. It is the worst manifestation of ageism and inequality in our community.”

This year, we are working with six other eastern metropolitan regional councils – Boroondara, Knox, Maroondah, Monash, Whitehorse and Yarra Ranges – to deliver the *EveryAGE Counts* campaign and raise awareness about ageism. The campaign is coordinated with support from the Inner East Primary Care Partnership and is part of the national campaign.

Titled *EveryAGE Counts in Melbourne's East*, this joint campaign will challenge stereotypes of older people and encourage people to speak up and take action.
